Fear is something we all have to live with. The only thing that separates all of us, is how we deal with it.



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

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

It seems that sometimes we get caught up in the music of today and forget about the groups that have been singing for a while. One band that was big in the 70s and 80s was Lynyrd Skynyrd. Skynyrd is known as the signature rock group of America's working people. Sophomore Jayla Stephens said, "I like the band because they're freakin' awesome. The music is awesome." Junior Tara Biggerstaff said, "They're the awesomest band ever! They have cool music." Both Stephens and Biggerstaff had concert tickets but the shows were canceled.

Their first album, "Lynyrd Skynyrd", came out in 1973. In 1974, their second album "Second Helping" was released, getting them their first charting single, "Sweet Home Alabama". Junior Dustin Brown said, "Sweet Home Alabama' is my favorite song from the group." The band's first top 20 song was "Freebird", released in 1975. On October 20, 1977, singer Ronnie VanZant, bass player Steve Gaines, and road manager Dean Kilpatrick were killed in a plane crash. Allen Collins later died after being in a paralyzing car crash in 1986.

In 1987 old and new members formed a new Lynyrd Skynyrd. The new group included Gary Rossington, Leon Wilkeson, Artimus Pyle, Ed King, Johnny VanZant, and Billy Powell. From 1988-2000 they released eight new albums and one greatest hits CD.

The group continued touring in 2001 and released yet another album in 2003. Skynyrd's latest tour was in 2004, celebrating 30 years of "hard rockin'." Still today, after over 30 years, the band continues to tour.

The draft

There are approximately 1.4 million personnel available for duty in our military right now. In times of peace, we have more than enough to protect the U.S. homeland and abroad interests. But when a larger problem arises, the military may need to call in reserve forces. In a major conflict, the United States may even set up the draft, taking soldiers from the general civilian population.

The idea of a military draft, also called conscription, has been around in one form or another since ancient times. In its relatively short history, the United States has implemented a number of different conscription systems to fill its military ranks in both peacetime and wartime. Currently, the United States is not practicing conscription; it has an all volunteer military,

meaning active troops serve on their own agreement. The military is able to recruit enough troops to fill its ranks, at least during times of peace. Additionally, the United States maintains a volunteer national guard and a corps of volunteer reserve troops. These highly trained forces stand ready to assist the military at the president's command.

Men between 18 and 25 are legally required to register with the SSS within 30 days of reaching eligibility. The SSS keeps the names and addresses of all registered men on file so they can be called up easily if the draft is reinstated. Most U.S. citizens become eligible on their 18th birthday; others become eligible the day they are no longer exempt (the day they drop out of a military academy, for example). Eligible aliens are required to register within 30 days of entering the country.

Draft reinstatement is always a possibility in any time of military crisis. We should always be ready.



Tamiflu has been proven to help nullify symptoms of the flu and significantly increase the chance of survival for those who take it. Though Tamiflu isn't the answer to stop a would-be pandemic, it will be a tool used to fight it. The only effective method is quarantines when the illness flares up in certain area.

Most nations have already decided on contingency plans for a flu pandemic and are already putting them into action. The United States has only just begun discussing ideas. 
Since Katrina, the Federal Emergency Management Agency(FEMA) has been in the hot seat because of blunders in the

This could be part of the cause for the increasing numbers of people in the United States who lack the ability to regulate food intake.


Researchers say drinking diet sodas is

not the sole cause of obesity, but it could be a contributing factor. Those who drink diet soft drinks in moderation won't be hurt, but water is still the best bet.

Researchers also encourage anyone who does drink diet sodas not to switch to regular soft drinks and for the person who drinks four or five regular soft drinks a day that is 600 wasted calories. If a person is to do that every day, they'll gain a pound a week. Some students here at high school drink sodas due to the mere fact that they don't like anything else that is offered. Sophomore, Jeff Robinson states, "I drink a soda for lunch because I really don't like anything else they have and knowing that I can gain a pound a week doesn't really bother me. I'm trying to gain weight anyway."

Draining of Dolan's Lake has begun



On September 8th, the final decision of draining Dolan Lake was made. As water levels have already begun to drop, fish have been initiated into a feeding frenzy.

The total area of the lake was 75 acres, but has already started to drop to the designated level of approximately 20 acres

by this coming December. The reason for such a drastic change in a short period of time is to further develop the sport fish population.

The department of Hamilton County Fish and Wildlife Conservation Area says that for several years the sport fish population has been on a down hill slope. The declining population is mostly due to an excess of unwanted species.

"I think the idea of draining Dolan's Lake

is great. Unwanted fish will be out and fishermen can focus on what they are trying to catch," says Junior, Anthony Jenkins.

While there is still a limit on the fish you may take home, this will soon change and the public will be encouraged to fish out

Once the lake is ready for restocking, fish such as large mouth bass, channel catfish, black crappie, bluegill and red ear sunfish will be added.

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

The sweet smell of success



We are in the midst of a very exciting time in Foxes' sports. The football team may be on the verge of their first playoff berth in about a decade. The boys' and girls' cross-country teams have captured the Black Diamond Conference championship every season that they have been a member. 2005 was no different, as they narrowly escaped with a four-point win. The volleyball team has unsurprisingly compiled a very solid record and look forward to doing well in postseason play after gliding to an 8-0-conference record in route to the BDC title.

The boys' golf team was an impressive 42-16 and sent two representatives to Sectionals.

We have had a very successful fall, and as the winter sports draw nigh it is clear that Foxes fans still have reasons to smile. The boys' basketball team returns three of their previous five starters and two other players that saw major varsity minutes. Senior Jerrod McGill will also return to action this year, after being sidelined due to injury as a junior. Expectations are also high for the Lady Foxes, as they return all five starters from a 30 win team.

Since the beginning, Foxes' fans have steadily grown more and more accustomed to successful basketball programs. The boys' program ranks first in school history in wins, compiling well over 600. The boys' basketball team also paces all other school sports in: regional titles (19), 18+ win seasons (23), fewest losing seasons (2), and win percentage (.723). In 1984, the boys' basketball team became the only team in school history to capture an Illinois state championship. That team, to this day, is the only undefeated state champion ever, in Illinois.

The girls are by no means mediocre, either, on the hardwood. After going an awful 11-77 in their first 6 seasons, the girls have since had 23 winning seasons in the last 25 years. Last winter the girls broke the single season win record previously held by the 1986-1987 team. That 86-87 team got third place in state and is the only Foxes girls' team ever to do so.

Historically, the boys' and girls' cross country teams have not lagged far behind the pace that the ball-bouncers have set. The teams have six state tournament appearances between them, to go with a total of 13 regional titles. The boys' team also won second place at state in 1997-1998.

Other state appearances made by past Foxes teams are: 1989-90 Boys Baseball; back to back runs at state by the football team from 1977-79; and the football team again in 1986-87 and 1992-93. The boys' golf team also made a run to state in 1994, and in 1982 the boys' track and field team finished sixth at state. In 1992-1993 the scholastic bowl team also made an appearance at state.



Walkie-Talkie Watch?






If you don't have a cell phone, maybe the new walkie-talkie watch would be for you.

Ted Koppel has won every major broadcasting award, including 37 emmies.


ABC News announced on October 17 that they would replace the legendary anchor for "Nightline", Ted Koppel. Koppel




As far as making films of the other books, no news has been announced at this time. However, Disney is sure not to abandon this project as this film has been named, "the most anticipated movie of the year."

New iPod hits the market


